#### PROGRAM NOTES

Hail Minnesota (1904) was written by University of Minnesota students Truman E. Rickard and Arthur E. Upson. The University of Minnesota Alumni Association, owner of the copyright to the song, released its copyright to the words and music, and in 1945 the Legislature adopted "Hail Minnesota" as the state song. The arrangement played today is by Joseph Komro, longtime director of the Minnesota State Band.

The Minnesota State Band Fanfare (2023) is the winner of our fanfare composition contest. Written for the brass section of the band, it effectively emphasizes the sonorities of the brass as well as their jubilant brilliance to celebrate our 125th Anniversary.

An Original Suite (1924) was composed by Gordon Jacob while he was a student at the Royal Academy of Music. By his description, the title was given to the work by the publisher, Boosey & Hawkes, a decision he later regretted. Throughout the work, Jacob often emulates folk tunes. The March resembles a British march in structure. Listen for the same drum figure at the beginning and ending of the movement. Jacob described the Intermezzo as being more Irish than English "folky". The reason being that *Londonderry Air* was very popular at the time. The Finale is a type of rondo, with contrasting sections of melody and accompaniment.

Song of the Seer (1995) is based on two Dakota songs. We are first introduced to the slow, lyrical Song of the Seer, Wicasa-Atawan Olowan, as sung and told by Tanka-Ptecila (Short Bull), a Holy Man, Prophet, or "Medicine Man". This song is sung when the tribe is going to war, just before the scouts set out to find the enemy. The second theme is based on Olowan (Song), as sung and told by Tasunke-Ciqala (Little Horse). It tells of how an aged warrior sees the young men setting out to war. As he thinks of his own by-gone glory, he sadly realizes that he is now only an old man with the toothache.

**Earth Song (2012)** features sweeping melodic lines and intense dynamic contrast, capturing the gamut of emotion in this beautiful transcription for band. Originally composed for unaccompanied voices with Ticheli's own text as inspiration, the work unites the power of words and images with melody, harmony, and dynamics.

Canticle of the Creatures (1984) takes its inspiration from the writings of St. Francis of Assisi (1181-1226), founder of the Franciscan religious order. His simple life of poverty inspired many, and he is admired because of his love and respect for all creation. He expressed his religious ideas in poems as well as through ministry. These poems were not written to be read in prayer books, but to be sung by the friars as part of their preaching and devotions. Canticle of the Creatures sings praise to many of God's creations, with each movement depicting the stanza of the poem after which it is titled.

Mars & Venus March (2023) is the third movement of John Philip Sousa's Looking Upward Suite. The idea for the march came while Sousa was gazing at the heavens on a clear evening. Sousa's suites were prominently featured in his band concerts, but they do not enjoy great popularity today. One reason for this is because Sousa could interpret his own music far more effectively than any other conductor. This new arrangement by Minnesota State Band member Brian Black was written in celebration of the Band's 125th anniversary.

**Salvation is Created (1912)** first appeared as a six-voice choral work. It is an arrangement of a Kievan chant, a Communion hymn intended for the Russian Orthodox liturgy for Friday. The form is very simple, consisting of two nearly identical verses that differ only in their final cadences. The text is taken from Psalm 74: Salvation is made in the midst of the earth, O God. Alleluia.

Porgy and Bess (1935) premiered on Broadway in 1935 and has been controversial ever since. Although the story about an African American community was created by White collaborators, Gershwin insisted that all performances be by Black casts. And while it offered valuable opportunities for Black artists, it was criticized as an inappropriate depiction of Black culture, with dialect that reinforced stereotypes. Yet *Porgy and Bess* has endured, resonating with audiences of all backgrounds. At its core, it's a very human story, about connections and choices made in difficult times, with melodies that move us.

First Suite in E-flat for Military Band (1909) occupies a legendary position in the wind band repertory and is one of the earliest examples of modern wind band instrumentation still performed. Holst began with *Chaconne*, a traditional Baroque form that sets a series of variations over a ground bass theme. The *Intermezzo* is a quirky rhythmic frenzy that contrasts everything that has preceded it. The *March* begins shockingly, with a furious trill in the woodwinds articulated by brass and percussion. This sets up a lighthearted mood, which eventually takes up the more traditional mood of a British march. The coda makes brief mention of elements from both the *Chaconne* and *Intermezzo* before closing joyfully.
